#### HORSE EDUCATION HOURS

Before you can participate in any 4-H horse project or activity, you must have 6 hours of Equine Education delivered by a Kenton County Certified Horse Volunteer Leader, between Sept. 1, 2022 and April 1, 2023.

#### Horse Education hours are earned by attending horse club meetings.

Kenton County has one horse-related club, the Blazing Bridles. Any child age nine and older is invited to join the fun. Club members gain a sense of belonging from the comradeship with others of similar interests and varying ages. The club meets on the **second Thursday of each month at the Serpentine River Farms**, 10217 Locust Pike, Ryland Heights.

The horse program helps youth develop desirable character traits including leadership, initiative, self-reliance, responsibility and sportsmanship. They become better prepared for citizenship responsibilities by working in groups and supporting projects and activities. This program also helps 4-H members enhance their horsemanship knowledge and skills and learn more about the business of breeding, raising and training horses, mules or ponies.

In addition, 4-H members develop a greater affection for, and humane attitude toward, animals; gain an appreciation for horseback riding as a healthy, wholesome form of recreation; and learn more about safety precautions to prevent injury to themselves, their mounts, and others. Other county events include the ride/drive program and county fair. District-wide events include horse judging contests, horse shows and horsemanship camps. State-level competitions include special contests and shows during the summer.

#### 4-H RECOGNITION POINTS LOG SYSTEM

The Kenton County 4-H Recognition Points Log is a system for each 4-H'er to record everything they've done throughout the program year. A designated number of points is awarded for a variety of activities. These logs are used to determine the outstanding boy & girl award that is presented each year at the 4-H Recognition Banquet. They are also helpful when applying for the Bronze, Silver, and Gold Honors.

The 4-H Recognition Points Logs are available at the extension office or online at: kentoncountyextension.org. Be sure to download and save changes each time. Recognition Points Logs for the 2022-2023 year will cover from September 1, 2022, through August 31, 2023. All Recognition Points Logs are due to the Extension Office on Thursday, Sept. 7, 2023.



#### Certification Workshop for 2022-2023

Two in-person certification workshops will be offered, in addition to two virtual certification options next Program Year. Please save these dates. Registration information will be sent out in late summer.

**In-person option:** In-person certification workshop is being offered.

January 14, 2023 - Grayson County Extension Office, Leitchfield, KY (State Registration Deadline: December 2)

The fee for the in-person workshop will be \$50, and will include lunch and snacks (\*\*see below for additional fees related to horse and livestock kits).

**Virtual option:** The virtual option is provided using Nearpod, an online educational website. The online course consists of several pre-recorded videos, slidesets, and a teaching practicum. Part of the teaching practicum requires that the volunteer meet with their agent, demonstrate the lesson they focused on in their practicum, and discuss that with their agent. Their agent must then sign off on the Teaching Practicum Form and submit that to the State 4-H Office. Volunteers can do the online course at their own pace.

March 15 (State Registration Deadline: March 1)

The cost is \$25 per person. Contact your 4-H Agent as soon as possible to meet deadlines.





#### THIS MONTH'S TOPIC: CAFFEINE

You might know about foods or drinks that people say give them more energy or help them feel more awake. These foods and drinks have a chemical called caffeine. Caffeine is a stimulant. Stimulants make us feel more awake and alert. Many people have drinks with caffeine in them because they think it helps them to wake up and feel sharper.

While caffeine comes from plants, it is not always safe. It can hurt you if you eat or drink too much. Too much caffeine can make you feel shaky, have an upset stomach, headaches, make it hard to concentrate, and even cause trouble sleeping.

Both children and adults should limit the amount of caffeine that they eat and drink daily. You can do this by choosing not to drink or eat things that have lots of caffeine. These types of drinks (and some food) have large amounts of caffeine in them:

- · Energy drinks
- Sodas and cola
- · Sports drinks
- Coffee Chocolate

Energy drinks make the top of the list because they have the most caffeine and the most sugar of any of the items. This makes energy drinks dangerous to kids and adults. They contain lots of the things our bodies do not need, and very little that our bodies do need to feel good and do our best.

In fact, there is no nutritional value in caffeine at all! This means that your body does not need any caffeine to work its best and grow to its full potential. In fact, some studies show that children who eat or drink a lot of caffeine do not grow as tall or as strong as they could have otherwise.

Instead, choose drinks and snacks that have what your body needs to grow! Water and milk are great drink choices to make every day. Your body needs water to feel its best, and low-fat milk has calcium and vitamins to strengthen your bones. You can add fruits or other natural flavors to water to mix it up from time to time. Or drink seltzer water if you really want a drink with fizz. Try adding one of these delicious flavor boosters to your water or mix and match to create your own unique combination!

- Strawberry slices
- Orange slices or wedges · Lemon or lime wedges
- Cucumber slices Mint leaves
- Watermelon cubes

- After the state fair, the ham is returned to the 4-H'er.

### 2023 Kentucky Agriculture Poster and Essay Contest

"Emphasizing the importance agriculture plays in our everyday lives reveals its importance in all we do and have. This year's contest allows students to give that knowledge greater thought."

Students in grades K-12 may submit a poster, an essay of 500 words or less, or a digital entry, which may be photos or original digital artwork. Each entry must include the written theme and be postmarked by Friday, March 3, 2023.

Winners will be notified by Friday, April 14, 2023. Winners in the poster and essay competitions will be selected in each grade. One statewide winner will be selected for digital artwork. Each winner will receive a \$100 award from Kentucky Agriculture and Environment in the Classroom and will be recognized at the 2023 Poster and Essay Contest Awards Ceremony next year.


